This means Ruskin is in the top 1% of state schools for sport nationally. School Sports Magazine rankings are based on performance of competitive school teams across all age groups in a wide variety of national competitions.

Sixth Form Run General Election Campaign

Year 13 Politics students organised an academy mock general election as part of their work on elections and voting system. This was run in parallel with the national general election campaign and students got to choose between the parties contesting the seat for Grantham and Stamford. Charlie T, Year 13, was our returning officer and designed a system of voting which included both First Past the Post (FPTP) and also the alternative vote (AV) where the voters can express preferences. Sixth Form students led the political parties involved fighting campaign.

As part of events, Sixth Form students and staff were invited to a lunch time Q&A session with local general election candidates. Students' questions included university fees, the NHS, tax and the candidates' positions on Trident. Our poll returned a big win for the Conservatives (48%) followed by Labour (23%), the Green Party (18%) and the Liberal Democrats (11%).

A fun and enlightening exercise in helping students understand British democracy and encouraging them to recognise the purpose and process of voting.



Orangutan Foundation Fundraising: From Wreath Making to Treat Sales

The Geography Leaders are celebrating a hugely successful first term fundraising for the Orangutan Foundation. In just one week from Monday 2nd – Thursday 5th December they managed to raise an amazing £739.58. This was raised through the hard work of Mrs Geeson, who organised a brilliant evening of wreath making at the academy, and donated all takings to the

Foundation, as well as a week long bake sale. We would like to thank all students who baked goodies to sell, both the Geography Leaders and Year 7 students who showed such passion in volunteering their time for the cause, and managed to raise over £100 each day for the charity. We would also like to thank all students and staff for their generosity in buying the cakes

and many of whom SO donated extra money above what they had bought. This money alone can protect over 500 acres of rainforest in Borneo, helping to reverse the desperate situation facing this most fragile and threatened of habitats and extends the academy's contribution to an equivalent of over 1,100 acres protected in total.

Ruskin Achieves Eco-Schools Bronze Award

Big news...we have achieved the Eco-Schools Bronze Award. This is the first of the three-stage award process of the Eco-Schools programme, working towards getting the Green Flag award for the school. Our new Bronze Award recognises the amazing work already completed by students this year. The average time for a school to achieve the Bronze Award is six months and Ruskin have achieved this in half the time. To achieve this award, we have launched an eco-committee from scratch and completed an environmental review and action plan. Ruskin scored 109/300 in the environmental review, giving us huge potential to make an impact. The action plan sets out some exciting initiatives put forward by our students and work has begun in earnest, including a school-wide food and garden waste composting system, a new system for litter picks and discussions with various tree-planting charities. Plans are afoot for litter picks across Grantham, hopefully with an opportunity for families and friends to get involved as well, so keep an eye out for events. Huge thanks from the Geography department for the support from students and staff who have supported eco-schools.


