## Geography Students Travel to 'Breathtaking' Iceland

Ruskin GCSE and A Level geographers travelled to Iceland at the start of February for a breath-taking trip that is sure to remain with them for many years to come. Iceland is one of the few places in the world where you can visit and interact with a tectonic plate boundary offering chances to study how tectonics operate and affect people's lives. During the trip they were able to visit and observe geographical processes across natural hazards, energy demands, coasts, rivers and physical geography topics, common to both the A Level and GCSE courses they are studying

Excursions included the black beach of Reynisfjara (with its coastal landforms and basalt columns), the Eyjafjallajökull volcano and glacier, Thingvellir National Park (where they saw the two tectonic plates), Gullfoss' three tier waterfall and the Secret Lagoon where students relaxed and enjoyed the geothermally heated natural water surrounded by snow. To top it off they saw the mesmerising Northern Lights – the icing on the cake for what was an incredible trip!

## SOS Fashion Show: Fairview Farm Residents Guests of Honour



Whilst her mother said, "I am so pleased your fundraising is going well for this wonderful charity - thank you. They have been very helpful to us and are closely linked to other charities that we have had support from such as RNIB and VICTA. ## Ruskin Celebrates Chinese New Year





On Thursday 7th February, sixty Year 10 students took part in the national Intermediate Maths Challenge. On Wednesday 27th March, several Year 12 girls travelled to Bishop Grosseteste University in Lincoln to take part in an enrichment day, inspiring them to take part in Maths at university and beyond.

## Sixth Form Psychology

Sixth Form Psychology students have encountered a number of external speakers in the last term. Year 12 students had a talk from a local Cognitive Behavioural Therapist who explained her job role and gave broad examples of the types of client she has worked with. Students asked a range of questions including about the different types of mental health disorders she had encountered and how she became qualified for her position. Her talk tied in with the 'Treating Depression' element of the Psychopathology unit of A level Psychology. Year 13 students had a visit from a Prisoner Governor who has worked his way through the prison career system. Individual questions were emailed in advance to the speaker who then built his answers into an hour-long talk. Questions included: "What is the most interesting aspect of your job?", "What do you feel are the best methods of changing criminal behaviour" and "Have you ever had to deal with a serial killer?". The talk tied in with the Criminal Psychology unit of A level Psychology. Both sets of students felt that their studies had been enhanced by speaking to people who clearly utilise psychological techniques in their job roles.

## Photography: Crufts 2019

On Friday 8th March, a group of photography students attended 'Crufts' - the biggest dog show in the world at the NEC Birmingham. Over 27,000 dogs were competing for the prestigious title of 'Best in Show' alongside agility and obedience displays. The students captured fabulous photos of a huge variety of different breeds.

## Ambitious Sixth Form Students Prepare for the Future: Oxbridge & LSE

On Friday 22nd March, ten Year 12 students had the opportunity to attend the annual Oxbridge Conference at LSST in Lincoln - the second time that we have sent our students to this prestigious event. There were undergraduates and fellows from several disciplines such as History, Sciences and Law, as well as School Liaison Officers from both Oxford and Cambridge Universities who ran workshops with the students. The students that attended gained an informative insight into applying to competitive institutions and the application process.

On Tuesday 26th March, the London School of Economics and Political Sciences visited the Academy to give an informative talk to students about applying to competitive institutions and living in London. This gave students an insight into how to prepare their application and how they can make themselves stand out from other students. This preparation starts the UCAS application process where students will be starting to plan their personal statements after Easter and create their UCAS accounts ready to process their application in September.

## Health & Social Care Students Gain Insight to University Life

On Wednesday 20th March 2019, Miss Wright took a small group of Year 12 Health and Social Care students to Bishop Grosseteste University for a Health and Social Care taster day. On the taster day, the students had an introduction into the Health and Social Care undergraduate course on offer at the university. This included explaining all about the course, what sort of assessments they would have to do, the length of the course and what it could lead onto in the future. They were then taken on a tour of the university to get a feel of the surroundings as to what life as a student there is really like. The students had a talk delivered by a student at the university explaining all about different universities within the UK, the clubs and social activities that most offer and much more. This was great as it allowed the students to have a wider outlook on university life in general. The students were then able to finish the day with an interactive activity of designing their very own Health and Social Care professional based on 'not judging a book by its cover'.



## University & Apprenticeship Fair: A View From Our Sixth Form Students

On Friday the 15th of March, Year 12's took a trip out to Leicester King Power Stadium for a university and apprenticeship fair as well as a tour around De Montfort University. A Sixth Form student explains more below:

*"The university and apprenticeship fair gave us an opportunity to explore and broaden our knowledge on university life and options that we may not have considered. It allowed us to speak to people with specialist knowledge about the career path we are interested in and, for those that are unsure on the options available to us, it provided advice on potential routes. The trip highlighted decisions are more than just about entry criteria - It is important to regard the university atmosphere including the different facilities and people as well as the student satisfaction and position your chosen university is placed within the league tables for specific subjects. Whilst being at the university fair we were also offered a finance talk that gave us an insight on student budgeting, loans and money management. Students left the fair better informed and with a real feel for what we can expect over the next few years of our lives. As well as the university fair, we also took a tour around De Montfort University, looking at the different facilities the university had to offer.*

*The trip left many students more sure than ever that university is the right route for them, however, it allowed some students to consider alternative paths such as vocational courses when they delved deeper into the specification of the contrasting opportunities.*

*The trip was really interesting and has certainly given us food for thought as we start the preparation period of looking into our post 18 education".*

# Sports Digest Spring 2019

Ruskin sports' teams reached great heights throughout the year with a number of sports reaching their climax in term 4.



In badminton, the Ruskin teams were crowned Lincolnshire champions in the team championships in both the Key Stage 3 and 4 boys' competitions. This was a first for our badminton teams and enabled them to progress to the Regional finals to compete against the best from Nottinghamshire, Northamptonshire and Leicestershire. All our players performed exceptionally well against strong opposition making for a really good level of competition. Both teams finished a very respectable third with the key Stage 3 team only one point away from taking first place and

progressing to the national finals. The players forming these teams are; George R, Joseph C, Sam B-W, Gytis V, Leo G, Harvey D, Cameran S, Alex W and Toby F-D.

In football, our Year 11 boys went further in the National Cup that we have ever gone before. Their run in the cup took them to the last 8 in the country.



The cup had 538 schools entered with Ruskin successful in 7 rounds of the competition, 6 of which were drawn away, beating teams from Lincolnshire, Leicestershire, Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire. Our quarter final game took the boys to St Helens to face Rainhill where this fantastic run came to an end. Well done to all those involved in this superb achievement. Additionally in football, the Year 7 boys reached the semi-final of

the county cup after winning four rounds within the county, before being defeated by Spalding Grammar. The girls U13 team involving a mix of Year 7 and 8 girls reached the county cup final and were beaten by a very strong Bourne Grammar.

The annual rugby 7s tournaments have also been in action this term. Our Year 7, 8 and 9 boys teams competed. All Ruskin teams topped their groups in the morning fixtures and went into the top level cup competition for the afternoon. In the afternoon the Year 7 boys proved the most successful finishing third overall. The Year 8 and 9 teams both finished third of fourth in their afternoon groups. This is the best the Academy has done in these competitions and we hope to see further progress next year.



## Table Tennis: U16s Reach National Finals

Congratulations to our U.16 Girls Table Tennis team who travelled to Hinckley to compete in the National finals. This year our 'Team of the Year' qualified for the National finals after a successful journey through the Lincolnshire, Zone and Regional Finals to qualify for the last four teams in England.
