Summer 2018: GCSE & A-Level Results

The summer saw Ruskin celebrating its best GCSE results to date with more students than ever achieving the key English and Maths measure of grade 4 and above. Subjects across the board saw excellent levels of success under the new GCSE specifications with grade 9s achieved in Sciences, English, Maths, Languages, Arts and Humanities. There was also success at A-Level, with the Academy celebrating another excellent set of KS5 results following two years of hard work from the outgoing Year 13 cohort. The Academy saw more students than ever successfully progressing to some of the country's most prestigious Russell Group universities including Imperial College London, the University of Nottingham, the University of York, the University of Bristol and the University of Leeds.

Yorkshire Sculpture Park: GCSE Art



On Friday 12th October, GCSE Art students from Year 9 and 10 were lucky enough to visit the fantastic Yorkshire Sculpture Park for the day. The students had a guided tour by two of the park's artists in residence where they were given the opportunity to view, discuss and in some cases interact with stunning sculptures from world renowned artists such as Barbara Hepworth, Henry Moore and Ai Weiwei to name just a few. The afternoon gave the students the opportunity to apply their gained knowledge from the morning session to produce their own large scale sculptures. They worked with a wide range of both natural and man-made materials to create their pieces based on a theme of their own choosing.

Craig Martini, Head of Art said, "It was brilliant to see students really thinking about the materials they were choosing to work with and what impact that would have on the overall message

and theme of their sculptures. They all really engaged with the whole process and were clearly influenced by the work they had discussed in the morning session."

Ruskin Geography Partnership With The Orangutan Foundation

The Geography Department is proud to announce a new partnership with the Orangutan Foundation, an orangutan rescue and rehabilitation centre in Kalimantan Province, Indonesia.

Orangutans, inhabitants of the islands of Borneo and Sumatra, are under increasing threat as a species as their habitat is steadily being destroyed due to logging for timber, oil-palm plantations, fires and mining.

Founded in 1990, The Orangutan Foundation is a small UK charity that works to conserve the orangutan by protecting their habitat and working with local communities. The foundation works in Central Kalimantan, Indonesian Borneo to protect over a million acres of orangutan habitat and also runs an orangutan reintroduction programme in the Lamandau Wildlife Reserve. The reserve has a population of over 500 orangutans, half of which were rescued and released back into the wild

Cathy Smith, Head of Development at the Orangutan Foundation said, "We are delighted that The Priory Ruskin Academy are supporting the Orangutan Foundation with this fantastic initiative. Not only are the students raising vital funds to help protect the orangutan's tropical forest home but importantly they are raising awareness about the plight of this critically endangered species and its vanishing forest home."

This partnership with the Academy has been arranged with the aims of fundraising, and spreading awareness of the environmental issues threatening the Orangutan. In return, the foundation will provide first-hand accounts of the geographical issues at play, and will provide talks and learning resources. This will support our GCSE and A Level students, as they study the relevant modules.



European Cultural Week

This term saw the Academy celebrate European Cultural Week, with European Day of Languages being marked on the 26th September. Staff wove the theme into a variety of lessons throughout the week, be it a lesson opener or a core theme throughout the lesson. Food Technology showcased cultural diversity with food from around the world. Year 8 made Pizza and Year 7 made a traditional Polish cookie. These are usually made around Christmas time, but are a nice treat all year round. They were so popular we thought you might like the recipe!

Ingredients:

60g sugar

120g Clover butter

1 egg yolk

1 tsp vanilla extract

160g Self-Raising flour

2 dessert spoon jam

Method:

Mix together sugar, butter, vanilla and egg yolk, add the flour and mix to form a smooth dough. Roll into small balls, about cherry tomato size, (makes approximately 16).

Place on a baking tray and make a small hole in the top of each cookie and fill with jam. Bake for 12-15 minutes at 160°c.

On Thursday 4th October, Year 12 BTEC Level 3 Performing Arts students were given the amazing opportunity of working with a practitioner from the internationally renowned theatre company 'Frantic Assembly' who by their own admission have a reputation for 'inspiring innovative practice and unlocking creative potential'. Steven Miller (known for playing Doctor Lenny Lyons from BBC Drama Casualty) led a 2 hour workshop on physical theatre and devising techniques as well as answering Year 12's investigative



questions relating to their preparations for their 'Investigating Practitioners Work' examination in January. The workshop was fast paced and inspiring and allowed students to explore new ways of storytelling using physical techniques which included some really adventurous lifts!
