As part of the BTEC Year 9 Engineering course students have been learning how things work by taking them apart! The Engineering Box is provided by the James Dyson Foundation and has become a popular annual event for the Engineering Department.

The students have enjoyed getting their hands on a real product and improving their practical skills while learning about polycarbonates, polyoxymethylene and acrylonitrile butadiene styrene (ABS). As part of the project they have learned about how plastics are made, the difference between thermoplastics and



thermosetting polymers and the sustainability of different polymers. In future lessons students will learn about the processes which formed the components of the Dyson vacuum cleaner and develop an understanding of product specifications.




READING AT RUSKIN

CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL 25th - 28th November




