
Celebrate Mathematics on Pi Day

Pi Day is an annual, international celebration of the mathematical constant π . Mathematicians around the globe celebrate the importance of a value discovered nearly 3000 years ago and yet is used in many aspects of current life wherever a circular shape exists.

Pi Day was first launched in the 1980s in America because their date format of placing the month before the day presents March 14^{th} as 3.14 which is the rounded value of π .

At Priory, Mr McDonald, Head of Mathematics, used this day to highlight the importance of Mathematics by producing a Pi Day Dingbats competition.
