Headmaster's Report

Dear Parents/Carers

With your continued support, Ruskin Academy continues to thrive. Our students make us proud with the respect they show within and outside the Academy. Having now established ourselves in the new building we have plans to make the environment even more vibrant with the introduction of art around the Academy. This will include a selection of student and reproduced art works.

The sixth form continues to grow and we expect to be teaching over 150 students in September. With the increase in student numbers we hope that building of the new Sixth Form Pavillion will begin in September.... Watch this space.

You may be aware that we have an attendance target of 96% or above. If any student falls below this then we consider it a cause for concern. Although genuine illness and family events are authorised absence, they will still bring the individual student's attendance down, which can trigger questions about the overall impact on that student's education. We are currently

operating very close to 96% overall attendance, which is outstanding and with your continued support we aim to surpass this figure before the end of the academic year. 





BOCCIA TOURNAMENT



For the first time, Ruskin took a team to the Boccia Tournament at St George's Sleaford. Boccia is a game that is similar to bowls but is played by people with physical disabilities. We were conscious of the fact that none of them had played Boccia before (except for Angus!) so we arrived super early to get some practice in. After going over the rules briefly and having 2 practice games, the team had their first match, which they won 3-2. As the second game progressed they seemed to develop a better technique, and produced a convincing win of 7-1 against Peele B. After coming top of our group in the morning, we automatically qualified for the next round which is the Lincolnshire School Summer Games in July! In the finals, after two closely fought games between St George's A (3–9) and St George's B (3–6) our team finished 3rd in the whole competition and received bronze medals! It was a fantastic day and the team played exceptionally well.

After the great performance by the boys last term, we were then invited to the Regional Boccia Tournament held at St George's Academy in Sleaford. There were teams from Nottinghamshire, Northamptonshire and Lincolnshire and the winner of each group go through to the National finals. Kyle, Liam, Peter and Angus were determined to play their best. Unfortunately, their minimal experience showed when they played St George's, as they lost all but one of the ends (1-11). However, this wasn't too much of a disappointment as St George's had won the regional competition for the two previous years and had much more experience than our team. We had a break and then played a team from Northampton. The boys played exceptionally well and won 9-1.

WHAT IS BOCCIA?

Boccia is a precision ball sport, similar to bocce, and related to bowls. The sport is contested at local, national and international levels, by athletes with more severe physical disabilities. It was originally designed to be played by people with cerebral palsy but now includes athletes with other disabilities affecting motor skills. In 1984 it became a Paralympic sport, and in 2008 was being practiced in over fifty countries worldwide.




German Christmas Market

Science Outreach Programme

Out Lead Practitioner in Science, Mr Davidson, has been working with several of our local primary Schools, on a bespoke programme for each school developed with the Key Stage 2 teachers.

It is designed to give primary school students in years 5 and 6 access to specialised apparatus and to assist primary school teachers in the delivery of the new KS2 two curriculum. The students have worked enthusiastically worked with microscopes, studying microorganisms they have grown under aseptic conditions themselves and accessed the sort of evidence that scientists have used to refine our ideas about life on Earth. Schools that have benefited from this support include Belmont Community Primary School, Great Ponton C of E Primary School, Denton C of E Primary School and Harlaxton C of E Primary School.

Science Club



Science Club started once again this year, an after Academy club for year 7 and 8, where students can come along and try out Science experiments which they would not be able to do in Science every day. Each week sees a dedicated group of students coming along and working together, making interesting creations or completing cool experiments. So far this year, we have carried out a number of activities including making and launching bottle rockets, chromatography, making sparklers, and shrinking apple heads.

We had a huge turnout for a session on making a lava lamp, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Coming up in Science Club we have a Making an Electromagnet and a Forensics session after Christmas.

The Science Department have been working with local primary schools (including Gonerby Hill Foot, Great Ponton, Cliffedale and Harlaxton), on a project called the SCoRE programme. The SCoRE (Schools Collaboration on Resource Efficiency)Programme, is an award winning scheme developed by Lincolnshire County Council (LCC) in partnership with the Carbon Trust, aimed specifically at schools to help them reduce their energy bills and CO2 emissions.

Mr Bentley, Head of Science, has been liaising with LCC on this project. It has given primary school children the chance to visit The Priory Ruskin Academy and also work in the science laboratories.





Sixth Form Report

After sitting their mocks in January, students are now preparing for the real thing in the summer. Predicted grades are looking strong and we are hoping for another record breaking year in terms of Sixth Form exam success – watch this space!

The vast majority of Y13 students have applied to university and, of these, 100% have been offered places, some securing unconditional offers. Ruskin Sixth Formers are in demand and the Sixth Form has established itself as a first class route into Higher Education.

After a well supported and successful Sixth Form Open Evening in November, 150 Y11 students applied for a place in Y12 starting in September; this includes 45 students from other local schools. Our reputation is growing on the back of a 'good' OFSTED last year, the fantastic learning environment we enjoy and the very pleasing exam results in summer 2014. We are increasingly being seen as the place to be by 16 year olds. Our rapidly expanding Sixth Form will have 150+ 16-19 year olds in September.









To enable expansion, a new Sixth Form Centre is at the advanced planning stage and hopefully construction will commence in the summer. It will have state of the art facilities as we look to build a sixth form of 200-250 students.

On the sporting front our excellent football team continues to push for promotion in its first season of competitive action, with a string of victories. Netball and volleyball teams are also flourishing.

We will continue to offer an all round great experience for aspiring youngsters in a fast moving world.
